Child and Family Reforms

Child and Family reforms will only be maximized in a high collaboration/integration environment

58 County/Regional Centers have completed AB 2083 Memoranda of Understanding, establishing **multi-agency** Children's Systems of Care in California for the first time Exceptional reform opportunities at state and federal level are increasingly requiring local integration in planning, funding, and reporting:

- Student Behavioral Health Incentive Program
- CA Community Schools Partnership Program
- Mental Health Services Grants for Schools/Communities
- Family First Prevention Services Act (SB 153)
- California Advancing and Innovating MediCal
- School MediCal Expansion (SB 75)
- Probation Realignment (SB 823)
- Trauma Informed Care/ACES

Why "Collective Reform"?

More money alone does not equal better or even more care

Most reforms only target a cohort of youth, reinforcing "silos"

Family concerns vs community circumstances

Sustainable funding beyond the grant cycle

Data sharing necessary for care coordination and any measurable collective impact

Complex conditions require adaptive solutions

- Micro (client level)
- Mezzo (at program/provider level)
- Macro (at the "system" and community level)

Sustainable change requires focus on all/comprehensive approach

California's Reform Goals are supported in System of Care Research

Increased school attendance and graduation rates

Decreased school suspensions and expulsions

Decreased behavioral and emotional problems, rates of suicide, and substance abuse or misuse

Reduced caregiver strain and improved family functioning

Expanded array of home- and community-based services, individualization of services, and increased use of evidence-based practices.

Decrease need for Inpatient Mental Health services

Decreased Emergency Room interventions and Inpatient Mental Health for psychiatric or behavioral issues


Decreased rates of citation, arrest, and incarceration

- youth family led
- grounded in equity & justice
- culturally linguistically responsive
- community owned
- strength based



IO STEP PROCESS

CONVENE PRIVATE/PUBLIC LEADERSHIP GROUP to develop an integrated governance plan

ANALYZE EXISTING OUTCOMES and needs of community children and youth

AGREE UPON SHARED GOALS for children and youth

INVENTORY AVAILABLE PUBLIC/PRIVATE SERVICE/SUPPORT CONTINUUM to address needs and reach goals

IDENTIFY GAPS in continuum

5 DETERMINE PUBLIC/PRIVATE FUNDING STREAMS and opportunities

7 DEVELOP ACTION PLAN with deliverables and time frames that describes roles, responsibilities and resources of all partners/signatories

S ESTABLISH ONE CHILD · ONE PLAN PROCESS e.g., City Master Plan, cross system MOU, school based family plan


IMPLEMENT COMMUNICATION to inform children, youth and families of the available array of service/support continuum, including accessibility and availability

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EXECUTE CONTINUOUS QUALITY IMPROVEMENT to support ongoing data driven decision making
